RESOLUTION OF CESSION OF CONCURRENT CRIMINAL LEGISLATIVE JURISDICTION

California Government Code Section 126

WHEREAS the United States acting by and through the U.S. Department of the Navy has requested that the State of California make a cession of concurrent criminal legislative jurisdiction to the United States over lands within the Navy Broadway Complex in San Diego County, more specifically described in Exhibit 1; and

WHEREAS the California State Lands Commission, pursuant to California Government Code Section 126, has been authorized by the State Legislature to cede such jurisdiction for the lesser of ten years or so long as the United States owns the lands; and

WHEREAS the United States, acting by and through the U.S. Department of the Navy and pursuant to Section 3112 of Title 40 of the United States Code, by letter dated December 9, 2021, has agreed to accept such a cession of concurrent criminal legislative jurisdiction;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Jennifer Lucchesi, Executive Officer of the California State Lands Commission, hereby certify that the Commissioners for the California State Lands Commission met on August 23, 2022, and made a cession of concurrent criminal legislative jurisdiction to the United States for the lesser of ten years or so long as the United States owns the lands within the Navy Broadway Complex in San Diego County. A copy of the Commission's Staff Report No. 43 describing the terms and conditions of the Commission's action is attached as Exhibit 1.

APPLICANT:

U.S. Department of the Navy (Navy)

PROPOSED ACTION:

Consider Two Cessions of Concurrent Criminal Legislative Jurisdiction and Acceptance of One Retrocession of Exclusive Legislative Jurisdiction pursuant to California Government Code Sections 126 and 113.

AREA, LAND TYPE, AND LOCATION:

Federal lands comprising the Navy Broadway Complex in San Diego, San Diego County, and the Naval Air Weapons Station China Lake in Inyo, Kern, and San Bernardino Counties.

TERM:

Cessions: 10 years.

Retrocession: indefinite.

BACKGROUND:

Pursuant to Government Code sections 126 and 113, the Commission is authorized, on behalf of the State of California, to cede concurrent criminal legislative jurisdiction to and accept retrocessions of legislative jurisdiction from the United States. Legislative jurisdiction is the authority to make and enforce laws within a geographic area. When the State cedes concurrent criminal legislative jurisdiction, it grants the federal government authority to enforce State criminal law over federal property yet retains its enforcement authority. The United States seeks cessions because criminal law of the United States is limited, whereas State criminal law is much more comprehensive. The State, generally, has the authority to exercise its criminal law on federal lands, but the United States cannot do the same without receiving a cession of legislative jurisdiction. This concurrent, or shared,

authority provides for greater flexibility in enforcing criminal law. State or local law enforcement officials may struggle to access large or remote federal properties, such as military bases or national parks. However, if the state cedes concurrent criminal legislative jurisdiction over such properties, federal law enforcement officials may respond to incidents, ensuring a timelier response while reducing strain on state and local officials.

The Commission may cede concurrent criminal legislative jurisdiction only upon finding:

- A. The United States has requested such cession in writing.
- B. The federal lands are held for the erection of forts, magazines, arsenals, dockyards and other needful buildings within the purview of clause 17, section 8, article I of the United States Constitution or other federal purpose.
- C. The cession is made pursuant to and in compliance with the laws of the United States.
- D. A notice of the proposed cession has been given to the clerk for the board of supervisors of the county in which the federal lands are located at least 15 days before the proposed cession.
- E. The proposed cession is in the best interests of the State of California.
- F. The United States has agreed to bear all costs and expenses incurred by the Commission in making the cession.

Upon making these findings and the Commission having made a cession, the State and the United States will equally share the State's criminal legislative jurisdiction over lands affected by the cession. The cession shall continue only so long as the lands are owned by the United States and used for the purposes for which jurisdiction is ceded or for 10 years, whichever period is less. In ceding concurrent criminal legislative jurisdiction, the State reserves its full civil legislative jurisdiction including its jurisdiction over the land, water, and use of water with full power to control and regulate the acquisition, use, control, and distribution of water with respect to the land affected by the cession.

At some federal properties, the State ceded all or most of its legislative jurisdiction in the 1800s and early 1900s. These cessions have the now-unwanted consequence of preventing State or local law enforcement from assisting with incidents on these properties. Consequently, the United States often seeks to retrocede some of its legislative jurisdiction to establish a lesser degree of legislative jurisdiction to allow federal, State, and local officials to respond to incidents on these lands. The

Commission may accept retrocessions on behalf of the State upon and subject to each and all of the following express conditions:

- A. The United States must in writing have requested state acceptance of the retrocession, and unless there is an officer of the United States empowered by a United States statute to retrocede jurisdiction, the request shall be by the act of Congress. The retrocession may return all jurisdiction to the state or may provide for concurrent jurisdiction.
- B. The proposed retrocession is in the best interest of the state.
- C. A notice of the proposed retrocession has been given to the clerk for the board of supervisors of each county in which the federal lands are located at least 15 days before the proposed retrocession is considered by the State Lands Commission.
- D. The United States has agreed to bear all costs and expenses incurred by the State Lands Commission in making the retrocession.
- E. The acceptance of the retrocession shall be made at a publicly noticed meeting of the State Lands Commission. The determination of the State Lands Commission shall be final and the retrocession of jurisdiction accepted shall become effective when certified copies of its orders or resolutions have been recorded in the office of the county recorder of each county in which any part of the land is situated. The State Lands Commission shall keep copies of its orders or resolutions and make them available to the public upon request.

Acceptance of a retrocession is indefinite, subject only to subsequent cessions or retrocessions. Thus, if the Commission accepts the proposed retrocession, the subject lands will remain under concurrent criminal legislative jurisdiction indefinitely.

PROPOSED ACTIONS:

The Navy has requested by letter that the State of California cede concurrent criminal legislative jurisdiction over lands at the Navy Broadway Complex, more particularly described in Exhibit A, and the lands at the Naval Air Weapons Station China Lake, more particularly described in Exhibits C and D, for a 10-year period. The Navy utilizes these lands for national security purposes.

The Navy has also requested by letter that the State of California accept a retrocession over lands at the Navy Broadway Complex, more particularly Described in Exhibit B. Currently, the United States exercises exclusive legislative

jurisdiction over these lands but seeks to establish concurrent criminal legislative jurisdiction instead. If accepted, the retrocession would be indefinite.

STAFF ANALYSIS AND RECOMMENDATION:

AUTHORITY:

Government Code sections 126 and 113.

STATE'S BEST INTERESTS:

Ceding concurrent criminal legislative jurisdiction over the Navy Broadway Complex and Naval Air Weapons Station China Lake to the United States will share the State's authority to make and enforce criminal law with the United States. Accordingly, the United States could independently enforce criminal law for crimes committed on these facilities instead of relying on local law enforcement to respond and enforce the law. Thus, the proposed cession would alleviate the burden on local law enforcement agencies while preserving their authority to enforce the law for crimes committed at these facilities, if needed. For these reasons, staff believes that the cessions of concurrent criminal legislative jurisdiction are in the best interests of the State.

Accepting a retrocession of exclusive legislative jurisdiction and establishing concurrent criminal legislative jurisdiction over the lands described in Exhibit B would restore the State's civil legislative jurisdiction over these lands and share the State's criminal legislative jurisdiction with the United States. Consequently, the State's civil and criminal laws would apply to these lands, and local law enforcement would be able to enforce State criminal law on them. Also, because the retrocession would establish concurrent criminal legislative jurisdiction, the United States would also have authority to enforce State criminal laws on these lands, allowing the federal, State, and local law enforcement authorities to work cooperatively. For these reasons, staff believes that the retrocession of concurrent criminal legislative jurisdiction is in the best interests of the State.

CONCLUSION:

For all the reasons above, staff believes that approval of the requested cessions and retrocession are in the State's best interests.

OTHER PERTINENT INFORMATION:

1. Approval or denial of the requested cession or retrocession is a discretionary action by the Commission. Each time the Commission approves or rejects a cession or retrocession, it exercises legislatively delegated authority. If the Commission denies the requested cession, all legislative jurisdiction will remain with the State. If the Commission approves the requested cession, the United States will share concurrent criminal legislative jurisdiction with the State but have no right to a new cession upon expiration of the requested cession. If the Commission denies the requested retrocession, legislative jurisdiction will remain with the United States.
2. This action is consistent with the "Committing to Collaborative Leadership" Strategic Focus Area of the Commission's 2021-2025 Strategic Plan.
3. The United States has accepted the proposed cessions.
4. The United States agreed to compensate the Commission for costs incurred processing the requested cessions and retrocession.
5. Commission staff gave notice of the proposed Navy Broadway Complex cession and retrocession to the clerk for the board of supervisors of San Diego County on July 14, 2022.
6. Commission staff gave notice of the proposed Naval Air Weapons Station China Lake cession to the clerks for the boards of supervisors of Inyo, Kern, and San Bernardino Counties on July 14, 2022.
7. The subject cessions and retrocessions of legislative jurisdiction are not projects as defined by the California Environmental Quality Act because they are administrative actions that will not result in direct or indirect physical changes in the environment.

Authority: Public Resources Code section 21065 and California Code of Regulations, title 14, section 15378, subdivision (b)(5).

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

It is recommended that the Commission:

AUTHORIZATION:

1. Find that the following requirements of Government Code section 126 have been satisfied:
 - a. The United States has requested in writing that the State cede concurrent criminal legislative jurisdiction over the lands described in Exhibits A, C, and D, attached and by reference made a part hereof, within Inyo, Kern, San Bernardino, and San Diego Counties, State of California.
 - b. The lands are held by the United States for the erection of forts, magazines, arsenals, dockyards, and other needful buildings within the purview of clause 17 of section 8 of article I of the Constitution of the United States, or for another federal purpose.
 - c. The cession is made pursuant to and in compliance with the laws of the United States.
 - d. Notice of the proposed cession has been given to the clerks for the boards of supervisors of the county in which the federal lands are located at least 15 days before the proposed cessions.
 - e. The proposed cessions are in the best interests of the State.
 - f. The United States has agreed to compensate the State of California for its cost incurred in processing the cessions.
2. Cede concurrent criminal legislative jurisdiction to the United States over the lands described in Exhibits A, C, and D for so long as the lands are owned by the United States and used for federal purposes or for 10 years, whichever period is less.

3. Authorize the Executive Officer or her designee to execute Resolutions of Cession of Concurrent Criminal Legislative Jurisdiction for the cessions and have them recorded in the official records of Inyo, Kern, San Bernardino, and San Diego Counties.
4. Find that the following requirements of Government Code section 113 have been satisfied:
 - a. The United States must in writing have requested state acceptance of the retrocession, and unless there is an officer of the United States empowered by a United States statute to retrocede jurisdiction, the request shall be by the act of Congress.
 - b. The proposed retrocession is in the best interest of the State.
 - c. A notice of the proposed retrocession has been given to the clerk for the board of supervisors of each county in which the federal lands are located at least 15 days before the proposed retrocession is considered by the State Lands Commission.
 - d. The United States has agreed to bear all costs and expenses incurred by the State Lands Commission in making the retrocession.
 - e. The acceptance of the retrocession shall be made at a publicly noticed meeting of the State Lands Commission.
5. Accept a retrocession of exclusive legislative jurisdiction over the lands described in Exhibit B and indefinitely establish concurrent criminal legislative jurisdiction over them.
6. Authorize the Executive Officer or her designee to execute a Resolution of Retrocession of Legislative Jurisdiction for the retrocession and have it recorded in the official records of San Diego County.
