## Chap. 83.

## AN ACT to Incorporate the City of Benccia.

Passed April 24, 1851.

> The People of the State of Califomia, requresentcd in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

## ARTTCLE I.

§ 1. The district of country in the County of Solano, which is contained wilhin the boundaries hereinafter described, shall be a city by the name of Benecia, and the inhabitants residing therein shall be a corporation under the name aud style of the "Mayor and Council of the Oity of Benecia," and hy that name they and their successors shall be known in law, have perpetunl succession, suo and be sued, complain anid defend in all Courts and in all actions and proceedings, and may purchase, hold, and receive property, real and personal, within snid city ; may lease, sell, and dispose of the same for the benefit of the city; may provide for the regulation and nse of the lands belonging to the city, and may hare a common seal, and alter the same at plensure: Provided, they shall not purchase any real estate other than such lands or lots within the same as shall be necessary for the erection thereon of public buildings, or for laying out of streets or public grounds, or may be required for public cemetries.
§ 2. The boundaries of the City of Benceir shall be as follows: All Honndarles that tract of land lying on the north side of the Straits of Carquinez, as surveyed by Begjamin A. Barlow, Esq., Jato City Surveyor, and designated by his map now on file in the office of the Clerk of Solano County; the southern boundary shall extend to the middle of the chanuel of the Straits of Carquinez.
§ 3. The said city shall be divided into two wards, as follows: 1st Clty to Ward, all that part of the city lying east of First street; 2d Ward, all bento wardse that part of the city lying west of First street.

## ARTICLE II.

Of the Officers of the City and their Election.
8 1. The officers of the City of Benecia shall consist of one Mayor, city omieeno. eight Councilmen, ono Treasurer, one Assessor, one Clerk, one Attorney, one Marshal, and one Surveyor, and such other officers as are hereinatter authorized to be appointed, but no person shall fill and discharge the duties of any tivo of said oflices.

8 2. The Mayor shall be olected by the qualified electors of the city, Election and shall hold his office for one year and until his successor be elected and qualified.
§ 3. An equal number of Councilmen shall be elected by the quali- or Councllmen. fied electors of each ward, and shall hold their offices for one year and until their successors are elected and qualified.
§ 4. The Council shall havo power to increase the number of wards and to altor the boundnries thercof, and apportion the number of Coun- wails may cilmen to be clected from each ward: Provided, such alteration and apportionment be made three months previous to the annual election of City Officers.

8 5. No person shall be cligible to any office herein naneed, or author- who ellagle ized to be made, who is not a citizen of the United States, and who has not been a rosident of the State one year, and of the City of Benecia six months previous to the election.
8. The electiou of Mayor and Councilmen shall take place on the mivetion of first Monday of May in each year. The Council sharll appoint two In- Mryon to spectors for each Ward, and designate the places for opening the polls.
§ 7. All the provisions of the law now in force regulating elections, Laws and defining the powers and duties of the officers thereof, shall apply resterintug to the election for Mayor and Councilmen under this Act, except that two Inspectors and one Clerk shall be the only officers of election in oach ward of the city.
§ 8. The Inspectors and Clerk of each ward shall deliver to the per- Coruneate sous receiving the highest number of votes in the Ward a certificate of of election. election as Councilnnen, and shall also transmit to the Clerk of the Council a statement showing the nuruber of votes cast, with the number for each person; such returns shall be opened and counted in the presence of the Council, and a certificate of election be issued under their direction
to the person receiving the highest number of rotes for that office. When two or more persons hare an equal number, and the highest number of votes, a new election shall be culled by the Council, and shall take place within ten days thereafter.

\& 9. Any person who shall be entitled to rote for State officers shall be entitled to vote at all City elections, but no person shall be electod a. Councilman or be cutitled to vote at any City election unless he shall have resided in the Ward in which he votes twenty days nest preceding the election.
§ 10. The Mayor and Councilnon shall enter upon their duties the first Monday subsequent to receiving their certificate of election. Before entering upon their duties they shall take the oath of office, which may be administered by any Judge or Justice.
§ 11. The Council at their first meeting after tho annual election, and at any other mecting when from any cause it may become necessary, slall elect a President from their own body, who shall preside at all their meetings; and whenever there is a vacancy in the office of Mayor, or whenever the Nayor is absent from the city, or is unable from sickness or any other cause to disclarge the duties of his office, the President of the Council shall act as Mayor, and possess all the powers and perform all the duties of Mayor during such vacancy, absence, or disability.

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§ 12. Whenever any vacancy shall oceur in the office of Mayor or of nny Cuuncilman by death, resignation, removal, or otherwise, the Council shall order a sprecial election to fill such vacancy. The person clected to till a vacancy shall hold his uffice for the residue only of the term of his immediate predecessor.
§ 13. The Council shall each year, within a month after the annual election, elect the Treasurer, Asecseor, Clerk, Attornoy, Marshal, and Survegor of the Cits, who sball hold thrir respective offices for one year, and until their successors are elected and qualified, unless previously removed as provided in this Act.
§ 14. The Council shall have power to elect such other officers as they may deem necessary in the governmont of the City; and in all elections they shall vote viva roce.

## ARTICLE III.

## Of the Council, its Pouers and Duties.

§ 1. The Council shall meet on the first Monday subsequent to the annual clection, and the first Monday of each subsequent month in the year, and at sach other times as they shall by resolution appoint. The Mayor may call special meetings at any time by written notice to each member served personaliy, or left at his place of business or residence.
§ 2. A majority of the Council shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but a smaller number may compel the attendance
of absent members: Provided, that no tax or assessment shall be ordered except by a vote of a majority of all the members present.
§ 3. In the proceedings of the Council each mernber present shall have a vote, and the President shall also have a casting vote when the votes of the members are tied.
§ 4. The Council shall determine the rules of their proceedings and $\begin{gathered}\text { Raios } \\ \text { or Council }\end{gathered}$ the qualification and election of their members.
\& 5. The sittings of tho Council shall be open to the public, except situngs when tho intereats of the city shall require secresy; a journal of their proceedings shall be kept by the Clerk uuder their direction, and the yeas and nays on any question shall be taken and entered on the journal at the request of any two members.
\& 6. The Council shall have power within the city :
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1st. To make by-laws aud ordinances not repugnant to the Oonstitution and Laws of the State:

2d. To levy and collect taxes on all property, real and personal, made taxable by law for State purposes, not exceeding one per cent. per annum upon the assessed value of stuch property, except local assessments for local improvements, as hereinafter provided:

8d. To provide for the draining, grealing, paving, planking, improvement, repair, and lighting of the sireets, the coustruction of sidewalks, and keoping the same in repair and froe from obstructions.

4th. To cunstruct wharves, as far as ship's channel at the foot or south-ends of all streeta runniug into the water, aud aho at the foot or west-end of B., C., D., E., and E. strects respectively, and to colleet a revenue tax for wharfage at such public wharves:

5th. To provide for the rempral of obstructions to navigation in the harbor within the corporate linits of the city:
fith. To provide for the prevention and extinguishmant of fires, and organize and establish fire companies:

7th. To regulate the storare of gnnpowder, tar, pitch, rosin, and other extrennely combustible materials :

8th. To prevent and remove uuisances, and prevent and remove slaughter-houses, haystacks, and whatever clse may be injurious to the healch and safety of the city:

9th. To license, tix, or regulate, or prohibit tippling houses, dram shops, gaming and gambling houses, and houses of ill fame:

10th. To license, tax, and regulate auctioneurs, hawkers, pedlera, and pawnbrokers, and taveru bar-rooms, and billiard tables, bowling alleys, theatrical and other exhibitions, shows and amusements:

11th. To license, tax, and regulate hackuey coacles, wagons, earts, drays, and livery ftibles, and fix the rates to be charged for the earriage of persons and property :

12th. To license, tax, and regulate boatmon and porteris, and fix the rates of lighterage and porterage:

13th. To establish and regulate city police and night watch, and
prevent any riot, or disorderly assemblage in any street, house, or place in the city:

14th. To crect a workhouse or house of correction, and provide for the maintenance and government thereof:

15th. To establish a city hospital, and provide for the support of indigent sick:

16th. To erect market houses, establish market places, and provide for the government and regulation thereof:

17th. To provide for the erection of all public buildings required for the city, and regulate nad prescribe the manner of building partitioning, walls, and fencos:

18th. To provide for the establishment and support of public schools, seminaries of learning, and public libraries, and for the erection of suitable buildings for the same :

19th. To elect a superintendent of public instraction and a board of education, which board shall, at the time of election, be divided by lot into two classes, one half to continue in office two years and the other half to go out of oflice at the oxpiration of the first year, uponan election of members in their place for the residue of the term:

20th. To open, alter, and widen streets and alleys, and on the petition of persons owning two thirds of the property along the line of any alley within a block, to close such alleys:

2lst. T'u build and keep in repair bridges, culrerts, and floodgates, and to excarate canals through the bed of any street, on petition of the owners of two thirds of the property bounding or frouting on the proposed canal:

22d. To proride for supplying the city with water, and regulate the use of public pumpls and hydrants:

23d. To make local assessments for pumps and all other local improvements, on the petition of the owners of two thirds of the property along the line or fronting on such improvements: Proviled, such assessment shall not exceed in amount two thirds of the actual cast of such improvements :

24th. To borrow money upon tho faith and credit of the city; but no loan shall bo made for a sum exceeding twenty-five thousand dollars, including the amount of any previous indebtedness, without the consent of a majority of the electors of the city previously obtained; and any excess which may be roted, over and above the sum of twentyfire thousand dollars, without the consent of the electors being first had, shall be collected in an action of debt against tho Councilmen voting such excers:

25th. To appropriate money for any item of city expenditure, and to provide for the payment of any debts and expenses of the city: Provided, that no contract made in behaff of the city, conditioned for the payment of any sum exceeding five thousand dollars, shali be entered into till proposals for the same shail be invited by public ad-
vertisement for a period of ten days, and in any case the contract shall be given to the lowest responsible bjader or bidders: and Provided further, that ueither the Mayor, nor any Councilman, or other pablic officer under city appoiniment, shall, during the period for which he is elected to serve, bo interested in any such contract :

26th. To imposo and appropriate fines, forfeitures, and penaltiesfor the breach of any ordinances; but no fine shall be imposed for more than five hundred dollars, and no offender shall be imprisoned for a longer term than sixty days, or made to work on the streets or in the houses of correction for a longer term than thirty days, for one and the same offence:

27 th . To compel the attendance of absent members, to punish its members for disorderly conduct, and to expel menbers, with the concurrence of two thirds of the members elected.
\& 7. It shall be the duty of the Council to provide for the accoun- Aecountablity tability of all officers and other persons electod by them, to whon the receipt and expenditure of the funds of the City shall be intrusted, by requiring sufficient security for the faithful performance of their duties or trusts, which security shall be given by them before entering upon such duties or trusts. In caso such security becomes insufficient, additional security miay be required, and if not given, the Council by a vote of two thirds of the members may declare the office vacant, and elect another person to fill the vacancy.
§ 8. It shall be the duty of the Council to publish, ono month before the nnnual election of officers in each year, an abstract of the receipts and expouditures of the City, during the year euding on the last day of tho month provious to that in which the publication is made; and in every such statement of the different sources of the City revenue, and the amount received from each, the several appropriations made by the Council, the object for which the sarme wore made, and the amount of money exponded under caclh the amount of money borrowed on the faith and credit of the City; the authority under which each loan was made, and the terms on which it was obtained shall be clearly and particularly specified.

## ARTICLE IV.

Of the Powers and Duties of the City Officers, and their compensation.
\& 1. It shall be the duty of the Mayor:
1st. To communiente to the Council at their first meeting, and Dutbea of quarterly thereafter, a geueral statoment of the situation and condition of the City, in relation to its government, finances, and improvements, and recommend the adoption of all such measures as he shall deem expedient in relation to the prolice, security, health, cleanliness, ornament, and improvement of the City.

2d. To be rigilant and active in causing the by-laws and ordinances to be duly executed and enforced.

3d. To exccute a constant supervision and control over the
conduct and acts of all subordinate officers, and to receive and examine all complaints preferred against any of them for violation or neglect of duty.

4th. To sign all contracts made in behalf of the City, and countersign all warrants and licenses issued under order or ordinance of the City.

5th. To maintain the peace and good order of the City, and generally to perform all such actions as may be prescribed by this act, and the ordinances of the Council and the laws of the State.

6th. It shall be the duty of the Mayor also to sign all ordinances passed by the Council if he approve the same, but if he should not approve any ordinance submitted to him, he shall return it with his objections in writing to the Council, who shall cause the same to be entered on their Journal, and proceed to reconsider the ordinance. If after such reconsideration two thirds of the members elect shall agree to pass the ordinance, it shäll become a law. If any ordinance shall not be returned by the Mayor within one week after it shall have been presented to him, they shall become effective as if he had signed it.
Of Counellman.
\& 2. It shall be the duty of every Councilman to attend the regular and special mectings of the Council ; to act upou communications ; to report to the Mayor all subordiuate officers who are guilty of a violation or neglect of duty, and to aid the Masor in maiutaining the peace and good order of the City, and in enforcing the by-laws and ordinances of the Council.

§ 3. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to reccive all moneys belonging to the City, to keep an account of all receipts and expenditures in such manner as the Council shall direct; and be shall, whenever required by a resolution of the Council, present to them a full account of such receipts and expenditures for any period designated in the resolution. All moneys drawn from the City Treasury shall be drawn in pursuance of an order of the City Council, by warrant signed by the Clerk, and countersigned by the Mayor, and such warrant shall specify for what purpose the amount designated therein is to be paid. -
§ 4. It shall be the duty of the City Assessor to prepare within such time as the Council shall direct, and present to them, with his certificate of their correctness, à list of all the taxable property, real and personal, within the City, with the valuation thereof, and a list containing tho names and ocenpations of all residents within the City, and to perform such other services in relation to the assessment of property in the City as may be required by the Council.
§ 5. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of the City to keep the Corporate Seal, and all tha papers and documents belonging to the City, to file them in his office under their appropriate heads; to attend the meetings of the Council, and keep a journal of their proceedings and a record of all their by-laws and ordinances; to sign all warrants and licenses issued in pursuance of the orders and ordinances of the

Council, and affix the Oorporate Seal to all contracts and licenses; to keep an accurate account in a suitable book, under the appropriato heads of expenditure, of all orders drawn on the Treasury, and all warrants issued, with the name of the person to whom issued, the date of the issue, and all liceuses issued, to whom and for what purpose issued, the time for which the same were granted, and the sum paid therefor.
§ 6. It shall be the daty of tho City Attorney to attend to all actions Attormey. and proceedings to which the City is a party or interested therein ; to give his advice and opinion in writing whenever required by the Mayor or Council; to draw up all contracts and instruments to which the City, is a party, and to perform such other services connected with his profession as an Attorney as may be required by the Council.
§ 7. It shall be the duty of the City Marshal to execute within the Marshal. City and return all process issued and directed to him by the Justices of the Peace, or other legal anthority within the City; to arrest all persons gailty of a breach of the Peace or of a viclation of any ordinance of the Council, and to take them befuro a Justice of the Peace or other legal authority within the City; to collect the taxes of the City and pay over all moness into the City Treasury, received in pursunnce of the ordinances of the Council; to supervise and control the City Police and Watch; to attend the meetings of the Council and perform such duties while in attendance upon their meetings as may be directed by them, and to perform such other duties as may be preseribed by ordinance.
88. It shall be the duty of the City Surveyor to superintend the Burveyor. erection of all publie buildings, the public wharses, the grading, paving, and planking of streete, and such other improrenients as may bo authorized; to see that all the ordinances regulating strects and sidewalks, partition walls, and fences, are complied with; report to the Mayor all nuisances, obstructions, and encroachunents on the strects and sidewalks, and perform all such other duties as may be preseribed to him as Street Cummissioner.
§ 9. The Council shall define the duties of the officers elected by them Other onterns. whuse duties are not herein prescribed, and shall tix the fees and salaries of all officers elected by them.
§ 10. The Mayor and Couneilmen shall receive no compensation for Conponaaton. thoir services.

## ARTICLE V.

## of rhcorders' courts and jugticts of the peace.

§ 1. There shall be a liecorder's Court within the limits of the City Recarder's whenerer, in the opinion of the Council, the interests of the City shall leo cartablished. require the existence of such a Court, And when cstublished it shall possess all the powers and excreise all the jurisdiction conferred by law upon Recorders' Courts.
§ 2. Until a Recorder's Court be established, the Justices of tho Jusudeces'Coniof

Peace within the limits of the City shall have jurisdiction: 1st, of an action or proceeding, fine, or forfeiture, imposed by an ordinance of the Council ; and 2 d , of proceedings respecting vagrants and disorderly persons.
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Proceedings in Justices' Courts.
§ 3. The Justices of the Peace in the City shall also have jurisdiction of the following public offences committed within the limits of the City: 1st, of petit larceny; 2d, assault and battery, not charged to have been committed on a public officer in the execution of his duties, or with intent to kill; 9d, committing a wilful injury to property, and all misdemeanors punishable by fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or imprisonment not exceeding three months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.
\& 4. All proceedings and actions under this act, before the Justicas of the Peace within the limits of the City, shall be commenced by complaint setting forth the violation of the ordinance or the acts of vagrancy or disorderly conduct compluined of, or the offence clarged with such particulars as to the offence, time, place, person, and property, as to enable the defondant to understand distinetly the character of the offonce complained of, and to answer the complaint; and all complaints shall be verified by the oath of the parties making them. To the complaint the defendant may pilead, or he may answer or deny the same; such plea, answer, or denial may be oral or in writing, and immediately thereafter the case shall be tried, unless for good cause shown an adjownment may be granted. In all cases the defendant shall be entitled, if demanded by him, to a trial by a jury of six persons.
