Dear Commissioners:

I am writing to you because I am concerned about the climate, wildlife habitat, and environmental justice. I am urging you to 1) reject Lease 4196 for ocean water conduits at the Ormond Beach Generating Station (OBGS) and 2) develop a plan to ensure Oxnard community members can provide genuine oversight over the power plant's conduits and decommissioning.

OBGS is a peaker plant, which means that when it runs, it generates more pollution than other power plants and that the emissions it produces during start-up and shutdown are not recorded and reported. OBGS was only turned on four times in 2024; with California's ongoing access to solar generation and battery storage, the actual need for peaker plants is becoming a thing of the past.

The OBGS sits adjacent to one of the last remaining wetlands in Southern California. Although these wetlands have been degraded, this is one of the few areas in southern California with an intact dune-transition zone-marsh system. It is a home or migratory rest stop to 226 bird species, including the endangered Snowy plover. Ormond Beach Marsh is considered by wetland experts to be one of the most important wetland restoration opportunities in southern California. Furthermore, with sea level rise predicted for coming decades, coastal wetlands will have a vital role to play in flood mitigation.

All Californians have a right to a clean environment, but our history of discriminatory zoning and real estate practices has left disadvantaged communities near the most polluting power plants and more well-off Californians far away from sites like the Ormond Beach Generating Station. OBGS is located in a census tract that is predominantly communities of color who are exposed to pollution worse than 94% of other communities in the state. Please acknowledge and show respect for the Oxnard community members who have attended commission meetings sharing their concern about the Ormond Marsh and Beach and include them in planning the decommissioning of OBGS.

Thank you for ensuring all Californians have a better climate future, an environment that provides healthy wildlife habitat, and the ability to access and enjoy beautiful public lands.

California State Lands Commissioners,

I urge you to reject Lease 4196 for ocean water conduits, to ensure the Ormond Beach Power Plant does not receive a 3rd extension from other agencies, and develop a concrete plan no later than December 31, 2025 to ensure Oxnard community members can continue to engage and provide oversight around the power plant's conduits & decommissioning for the following reasons:

(Chair) Lt. Governor Kounalakis, in her campaign for State Treasurer, has promised to be a leader for climate resiliency and advancing clean energy infrastructure for the future of California. With the federal administration rolling back policies aimed to mitigate climate change—it is important that elected leaders will safeguard our State's commitment to a clean energy future.

During CA's record breaking heatwave in 2022, OBGS as an "Emergency" designated plant failed to meet energy demands given its outdated technology from the late 60's according to the [Regenerate California Coalition report](#).

Given South Oxnard's flood-prone geography and history of industrial waste storage with the inevitability of sea-level rise and flooding, the snail-paced progress to advance the plant's decommissioning & dismantling creates unnecessary risks of toxic chemicals leaching into nearby communities and compromising local wetland restoration efforts.

Public Comment:

1. REJECT Lease 4196 for ocean water conduits so that the Ormond Beach Generating Station does not receive a third extension from other agencies.
2. DEVELOP a concrete plan no later than December 31, 2025 to ensure Oxnard community members can continue to engage and provide oversight around the power plant's conduits & decommissioning.

The aging OBGS, commissioned in 1971, was originally intended for retirement in 2020. It has had two extensions and is now scheduled for retirement next year. The reason for the extensions is that the plant was needed to support grid reliability at times when it is needed. However, the plant has failed to meet this role as demonstrated in 2022 when it did not meet energy demands given its outdated technology.

Clean energy technology has progressed at a rapid pace since 2022 so that the OBGS can easily be replaced by solar and battery technology. This will not only go toward California 2045 goal of using 100% renewable clean energy sources, but will also be a major health and recreational benefit to the community living in the vicinity of the plant.

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Dear California State Lands Commission,

I'm writing in solidarity with the South Oxnard community that's had to live alongside the Ormond Beach Generating Station and the resulting air pollution for the past few decades all without beach access. I'm calling on the Commission to reject the amendment for Lease 4196, which would finally end this act of environmental injustice and make the shoreline open for all, as well as restore the local wetlands to protect the community against sea level rise in the coming decades.

At such a pivotal and critical time in environmental policy, especially as the federal government is threatening climate protections, communities like South Oxnard are dependent on state agencies to step in to keep them safe from fossil fuels. The Ormond plant's lease has already been extended twice and we are now almost 6 years since the original shut down period despite the plant's especially high curtailment rates and unreliability. A 2023 report from Regenerate California found that two of the Ormond Beach units were ranked first and sixth in the top 15 gas plants with the highest rates of curtailment during the severe heat waves in August and September 2022. Ormond Unit 1 had the highest curtailment rate at over 54,000 megawatt-hours, and Unit 2 had the sixth highest overall rate at more than 35,000 megawatt-hours. The plant had particularly high curtailment rates from midday September 5th to the end of the heatwave on the 9th. Using the EPA's CO-Benefits Risk Assessment Health Impacts Screening and Mapping Tool, the Ormond plant could've caused \$15 to \$19M in potential negative health impacts from massive spikes in sulfur dioxide and nitrogen oxide emissions, which spans premature mortalities, illnesses, and lost workdays. South Oxnard should not be asked to continue to sacrifice their health, well-being, and safety for an underperforming gas plant that repeatedly fails and only worsens the climate crisis.

South Oxnard residents experience more pollution than 94% of other neighborhoods in California as per CalEnviroScreen 4.0. They deserve a break from pollution and an end to the unjust legacy of fossil fuels in their backyards. I hope the Commission will listen to community members and support their request for a community advisory committee and a public engagement plan to make sure residents have a seat at the table for future decision-making processes surrounding the plant's decommissioning.

Considering Ormond Beach's history, I feel certain that you will agree it's the right thing to do to **reject** the lease amendment extending the term of Lease 4196 – Ormond Beach Generating Station (OBGS) from April 23, 2025, to December 31, 2026, for one seawater intake conduit and one discharge conduit.

Thank you for holding the decision-making meeting for this lease in Oxnard where community members can meaningfully participate. I hope the Commission will inform their vote based on concerns raised by Oxnard residents and allies.

Oxnard residents have consistently voiced their opposition to extending the lease. We want an end to the unjust legacy of fossil fuel power plants in our community.

Reviewing the broken promises, negligence and especially the environmental impacts, the case for the SLC to reject the amendment is hard to refute.

When the federal government is essentially abdicating its responsibility to protect the environment, State and local leaders have an increased obligation to step forward.
