I am writing to express strong support for the Commission's consideration of revoking Sable Offshore's state leases for the Santa Ynez Unit.

The case for revocation is straightforward. The Commission's own Chair noted that Sable's willful disregard for the directives of regulatory agencies does not engender trust or confidence in Sable's willingness to serve as a responsible partner, and stated that unresolved legal challenges with state agencies should be resolved prior to full restart of operations. None of those conditions have been met. Sable is now pumping oil anyway.

The pattern is consistent: unauthorized work under cease-and-desist orders, \$18 million in coastal commission fines, outstanding criminal charges, and now operating through a state park with an expired easement that California State Parks has explicitly rejected. The Commission itself found that Sable's failure to clearly and timely communicate its activities undermined trust and raised serious questions about its transparency.

The federal government's invocation of the Defense Production Act does not transfer or extinguish California's property rights or lease authority. The Commission retains full legal standing to revoke these leases based on Sable's demonstrated non-compliance. I urge you to exercise that authority.

California's coastline is a public trust asset. The Commission exists to protect it. Please move forward with revocation proceedings.
